via the Herald's facebook page. Candidates included Mary Faith Bell and Adam Schwend for County Commissioner; Brian Halvorsen, Vineeta Lower, Tiffiny Mitchell, and Randell Carson for State Representative, District 32 (top

picture); Representative David Gomberg and Thomas Donahue for State Representative, District 10; Mark Callahan and Marvin Sannes for US Representative, Congressional District 5; and Patrick Starnes (with a proxy) for Governor.

Questions regarding budgets, roads, housing, economic development, tourism, health care, the environment, natural disasters, and goals highlighted the values and goals of each of the candidates. 
What a successful and creative adventure between AAUW and TBCC evolved when TBCC took on constructing a new campus! The twenty eight trees planted in the landscape were to be dedicated for \$1,000 each to increase the AAUW endowment. Following is an excerpt from an article I wrote in the May 2016 newsletter.




We have had four very special members of our branch pass away: Alice Voges, Bernadine Seabrandt, Katie Fouste and Carol Thwaites. AAUW was very important to each of them, and they to us, who were fortunate enough to know them. Some of us have wished for the branch to dedicate a tree at TBCC in recognition of Tillamook AAUW and also talked about honoring the 50 year honorary members with a tree. A tree has been dedicated to Alice Voges, mostly through the bridge groups in which she was involved. The THS Class of 1964 also participated in that dedication as she was their advisor. The tree, recognizing our deceased friends/members as mentioned, has become known as the "AAUW Memorial Tree" and stands with contributions of \$770 to date. It would be awesome to complete this dedication. In addition we have three more trees available for dedication.

This has been a delightful project and a special opportunity to work with the TBCC Endowment Foundation and the TBCC staff to achieve a supporting scholarship. Our goal has been \$50,000. We have been at that level for a short time but it all depends on the market. This produces a scholarship over \$2,000. Future plans, after these remaining trees are dedicated, have changed. Cost of planting and lack of space indicate we will not be planting more trees. It would be awesome to find a new plan to continue to grow our endowment.
